Lowell passed away on Friday, June 12, 2020, in Albany, N.Y. The funeral service will be live streamed on the Stonacek Funeral Chapel Facebook page.

Lowell was born on March 15, 1955 in Norfolk, Nebraska. The son of Ronald Henry Lienemann and Helen June Coulter (Lienemann). He lived in Sydney, Nebraska for a short time and then moved to Randolph, Nebraska where he graduated from Randolph High School as salutatorian in the class of 1973.

On August 16, 1986 Lowell was united in marriage to Lori Nelson Lienemann in Houston, Texas and remained there, providing and raising his family. He never forgot his friends from the past and those around him. His greatest joy was watching his children grow.

Lowell was well known and respected for his interests, commitment and honorable way of doing every day.

Lowell earned an associate's degree in Applied Science in computer science technology/programming specialization from Houston Community College which he attained while being a father with two busy children and long time employment with Hewlett Packard. Lowell had many specializations, Boy

Scout Leader for Troop 1102 for many years, he sat on the vestry at St. Cuthbert's Episcopal church in Houston, and he was a strong participant in the Men's group bible study. Lowell, being a hard worker, was well respected for his long-time employment with Compaq computers which was later bought out by Hewlett Packard managing procurement, contracts and the logistics for the company. Lowell worked as a Hazmat driver for the Heniff trucking industry most recently. Lowell was well versed on many subjects due to his love of books.

Lowell best loved his wife, children, grandchildren, family and friends. He was active in his children's activities especially swimming and soccer. Lowell was passionate about his grandchildren, history and world affairs, feeding the homeless, weather, birds, and keeping his grass green. He liked being a volunteer and a helper to others.

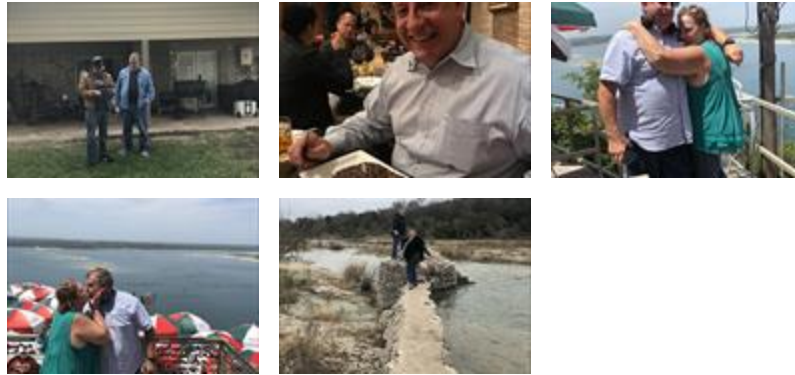

“Lowell was always my “big brother.” He was very proud of the “Lienemann” name and family. He took great pride learning about our ancestors. Thanks to him like Cole I didn’t drown in the old Randolph swimming pool. I jumped in behind him because I always thought I could do whatever he did. He also rescued me when I was riding a horse bareback & it took off on a wild run but not before laughing and hollering for me “to hold on.” Lowell is the big brother that made the steps to his tree house too high for me to climb and took the steering wheel off our toy tractor so I couldn’t ride it. Together as a family we rode horses, cut a lot of cockaburs out of the fields, milked cows everyday, as well as all of the other daily chores on a farm. He was an avid bookworm and had books stashed in buildings around the farm. He was so intelligent school was a breeze for him. We took piano lessons from Mrs. Hughes & he could play with very little effort. We both enjoyed learning to play “The House of the Rising Sun.” He introduced me to Guess Who, Creedence Clear Water Revival, Jefferson Airplane, Black Sabbath, AC/DC , Harry Chapin, Don McLean, & Bob Seger. When he was playful Lowell could get wound up and would howl like “Wolf Man Jack.” He enjoyed field work and nature especially the broods of pheasants he’d see while farming. He enjoyed teasing me as he could always get a reaction. He’d always steal my French fries. I learned from a bet one summer I could never eat as many tomatoes as he could. As my big brother when I was in high school no boyfriend was ever good enough. Thank goodness he got over that & walked me down the aisle when Joe & I got married. Although we raised families in different parts of the country we always kept in contact by phone. He would tell me about the beauty he witnessed as he drove truck across the United States. He was very proud of his family. He shared many stories about his wife, children, & grandchildren. Just a couple of weeks ago we visited about the wonderful neighbors we had growing up. We reminisced about our days in country school and friends from home. Lowell was athletic and I always envied how he could play baseball. He could surprise us with a “bunt” and make it to first base



very time. One of my treasured memories is when we went to Uncle Gene's birthday party & met so many cousins. I will miss our phone conversations the way we could have different views but could agree to disagree. I know he is now where we all want to be. Rest In Peace big brother.
